HERITAGE OPEN DAYS 8TH-11TH **SEPTEMBER** We are still at the initial stages of organising these and are hoping to try out some new ideas. It is still not too late to make suggestions. COMMEMORATION OF THE SIEGE OF 1216 The Committee is still in negotiation with the Medieval Siege Society and with English Heritage over the possibility of staging this event in June. There are a large number of difficulties to overcome when dealing with an unmanned site, which normally has free entry, not to mention the restrictions as an archaeological site. If it goes ahead it will take place on the weekend of 11th-12th June. In this event we shall need a great deal of support from members to help with stewarding etc.

THE ALDERNEY BAYEUX TAPESTRY FINALE We have been given the opportunity of displaying this in Berkhamsted as a contribution to one of the many anniversaries being commemorated this year. It is being displayed in a museum in Battle before coming to Berkhamsted. It was offered to Westminster following the depiction of William being crowned at Westminster Abbey, but that has been declined. We have only been able to book a hall for 4 days in a row, November 2nd –5th because of regular bookings. If the Alderney people agree it could be displayed then for a week in the Visitor Room at the Castle. Many of you will remember when

in the 1990s we displayed Jan Messent's Bayeux Finale. This Alderney one is based on her tapestry.

PERCY BIRTCHNELL MEMORIAL PRIZE 2016 Children from Year IV of the Thomas Coram C of E Junior School will again be participating in this competition, the topic of which will be the 'Foundling Hospital in Berkhamsted'. The Society awards two prizes of £20 book tokens for the projects, which are carried out in the children's own time.

Once again we have an article by a PhD student who requested access to the Society archives and in return has written an interesting article on Berkhamsted's soup kitchen.
