"... It was with interest that I noted your statement in the article that the tower clock was from **Thwaites and Reed of Clerkenwell**, as then in the ringing chamber when I was winding the wall clock there I noted that it was also from **Thwaites and Reed of Clerkenwell**. I don't know very much of the history of the wall clock; however, I do

remember **Priscilla Watt** telling me that it used to be in the vestry until it got stolen. After a pause it was recovered by the police and returned to the church. Having had it stolen it was then decided that it would be safer up in the ringing chamber. To the best of my knowledge it has just remained there ever since. I do not recall seeing a date on that clock."

Berkhamsted Castle: Adrian Barham, Chairman of Berkhamsted Castle Trust writes:

A lot has been going on during the winter months. A new panel radiator has been installed in the visitors' room and the door fitted with a draught excluder. This should help to keep the damp at bay during the winter months and stop the information panels and leaflets from curling. English Heritage has just finalised the Local Management Agreement appointing the Trust as local manager of the Castle for an initial period of 5 years from April last year (2019). We have also finally had the gate

line people counter agreed, purchased and delivered. It is due to be installed shortly. Berkhamsted Town Council has also just awarded us a grant towards the costs of a habitats survey of the whole castle site. The last such survey was conducted 25 years ago!

Unfortunately, our bid to the Castle Studies Trust for funding to do core sampling of the moats this summer was unsuccessful. In the absence of other funding, this work will not now happen in 2020.

On the evening of Sunday 22nd March a car crashed through the Castle fence on Brownlow Road and dropped the eight feet or so into the moat. The driver got rather wet and cold (the temperature was only 3°) and was taken to hospital. Our thanks go to the Police and paramedics for their assistance, particularly in the current circumstances.



Please take care if walking along Brownlow Road as the fence is badly damaged, and please keep away from the edge as there is a steep drop into the moat!

Norman Groves reports: Berkhamsted Heritage Hub

The National Lottery Heritage Fund project came in just under budget and has been signed off. **Dr James Moir** has now taken over as overall Project Director. The Hub strategy full report is available on the BLHMS website, with a separate summary leaflet.

To test the possibility of National Lottery Heritage Fund funding of about £1m+ for full delivery, a (mandatory) Expression of Interest document is being prepared and will be submitted in the spring. This document has a maximum of 1000 words, and is therefore limited in scope, but it does give the NLHF an early opportunity to look at potential outputs compared to other options for the East region, although priority areas for the region are not located locally. If approved, full implementation proposals will be developed later in 2020. This again would be a competitive bid.

BLHMS Committee Member **Norman Groves** is co-ordinator for one of the four key initiatives in the Strategy, the Virtual Hub. This initiative is looking at reviewing and rationalising existing local collections; a targeted digitisation programme; a drop-in digitisation scheme; options for a comprehensive website; and the possibility of local heritage apps. A sub-group meeting of people and bodies interested in the Virtual Hub will be organised as soon as world health issues allow.

Heritage Open Days we hope that these will be able to return for two weeks 11-20 September 2020 depending on Government advice "Hidden Nature" is this year's theme. **Jenny Sherwood** is busy organising these and all details will be advertised in the summer newsletter. Remember all events are free. Last year we had almost 400 bookings.

We hope to resume our talks on 16th September with **Zena Dickinson** speaking about Luton Hoo - Past, Present & Future – again this is tbc. We look forward to seeing you then. Take care everyone.
